Charges dropped against teacher accused of sex assault

TRENTON » After being arrested, jailed and prosecuted on a child's sexual assault allorations. on a child's sexual assault al-legations, city schoolteacher Robert "Mr. C" Ciaccia on Monday had his prayers an-swered when the state dismissed all charges against

"I'm just excited to get back to teaching," Ciaccia said in an exclusive interview with *The Trentonian* hours after being exonerated. "Tm hoping to be exonerated. "I'm noping to be put back in my classroom with my family. That's my fam-ily at Franklin Elementary. I wouldn't want to be moved to another school." Trenton Police on June 23


arrested Ciaccia at the public school on William Street and charged him with two counts of sexual assault and one count of endangering the welfare of a child after one of his fourth-grade students accused him of criminal sexual contact.

The victim, a 9-year-old girl, said Ciaccia touched her buttocks over her clothing on buttocks over her clothing on two different occasions at the school, once last year before to Christmas and another time on May 25. She also said she had witnessed Claccia molest two other students, but Claccia was clacked with teachers, parents and students and learned that "some of the victim's allegations were not credible."

"What do you do when a little girl comes in and says that 'a guy touched me?"
Travisano said. "The fact that they dismissed the charges as expeditiously as possible is a credit to that office. I don't have anything bad to say about any one of them from Angelo on down." Angelo on down."

Ciaccia "is a good guy, and he's wonderfully suited for the classroom," Travisano said. "It is thrilling for me to be able to make a meaningful difference in his life."
The defense attorney said he does not be recommended.

The defense attorney said he does not know why a student would falsely accuse his client of criminal conduct.

"I don't take sex assault cases as a rule," said Travisano, a high-profile lawyer based in Hamilton, "but I took Mr. C's case because I believed in his innocence from the beginning."

Indeed, numerous people from Ciaccia's co-workers and students to his former colleagues and associates provided Ciaccia with an overwhelming amount of

court Judge Thomas Brown signed the motion on Monday, and with that stroke of a pen, Ciaccia was fully cleared and exonerated of all charges.

Nick C. Travisano, Ciaccia's private attorney, on Monday said he believes the prosecutor's office "did the right thing" in June when it filed charges against his client based upon the victim's decades of teaching experi-

ter me."
Ciaccia, 45, of Falls Township, Pennsylvania, has two decades of teaching experience, mostly from educating Trenton Public Schools students at Franklin Elementary. He said he "cried a lot" during this ordeal but that he had "a lot of support" from people who knew the charges against him were "just false."

"It changes you," Ciaccia said of being arrested, charged and jailed for several days for a crime he did not do. "I'm a really positive person, but when something like this happens, you are tested. You are carrying a heavy weight with you cyery day and you have to have ery day and you have to have faith."

A married father of three children, Ciaccia said he hopes to return to teaching at Franklin Elementary when summer recess ends and students return to school Sept. 6. The Trenton Board of Education suspended him with pay. The Pennsbury School District in Pennsylvania stripped Ciaccia of his other job as the William Penn Middle School wrestling coach.


